BOS Approves New Ambulance Fees Following Public Hearing

On Aug. 1, the *Concord Monitor* reported that the previous day, Governor Kelly Ayotte had signed Senate Bill 245. The new law, which is intended to prohibit surprise ambulance billing, will take effect in 2026. Weare Fire Rescue was a couple steps ahead of the governor. On July 14, Chief Mark Roarick and Assistant Chief Trevor Anderson presented selectmen with a proposal to revise ambulance billing fees, in part to coincide with SB 245, which they explained boosts insurance companies' standard reimbursement rate to 325% of the federal Medicare rate. They also said that the Weare fees had not been revised since 2018. A public hearing on the changes was scheduled for July 28.

At the public hearing, Assistant Chief Anderson explained the three levels of ambulance service and how they related to billing. Levels of service are as follows:

BLS (Basic Life Support): Basic medical monitoring without advanced interventions.

- **ALS 1** (Advanced Life Support 1): At least one advanced intervention like IV therapy or medication.
- **ALS 2** (Advanced Life Support 2): More intensive care with multiple medications or advanced procedures.

The current rates and proposed rates are as follows:

	Current rates set in 2018	Proposed rates matching 325% of Medicare
BLS	\$800	\$1,490.68
ALS 1	\$1,200	\$1,770.18
ALS 2	\$1,800	\$2,562.14
Mileage	\$15/mile	\$29.25/mile

Following public input including a question-and-answer period, the Board of Selectmen unanimously approved the proposed rates (5-0). Selectman Dearborn noted that from an inflationary standpoint, the increases are somewhat in line with cost of living increases over the seven years since rates were last adjusted.

South Weare Church

82 Deering Center Road, Weare

The South Weare Church, one of Weare's oldest churches, is undergoing renovation in honor of its 150th anniversary. A new roof was completed in July, and the next project is the restoration of the gothic windows. The church was built in 1875 on the location of an earlier church built in 1789. It was originally known as the South Weare Union Church because the congregation was composed of two protestant sects – three-quarters were Congregationalists and one-quarter were Universalists.

By agreement, the Universalists were entitled to use the building every third Sunday of the month and on the fourth Sunday in August. The Congregationalists had use of the building the rest of the year. Today's building retains its original pews, wood stoves and pipe organ. The site includes a set of horse sheds used in the days when parishioners arrived at church in a horse and buggy, and a parcel of land donated by the late H. Arlene Thorp.

Dr. Daniel K. Poling, Pastor of New York's Marble Collegiate Church, preached at the South Weare Church every Sunday during the summer from 1953-2007. The church's Centennial celebration was held on Aug. 3, 1975, and the sermon was delivered by the late Dr. Norman Vincent Peale who is best known for his book The Power of Positive Thinking.

Members of the congregation and many guests attended the celebration dressed in historic clothing. The church, which seats two hundred, was completely filled for the event. Today the South Weare Church is a popular site for weddings and baptisms, and the Trustees look forward to bringing new life to this wonderful building. Stay tuned!
