Cornerstone Chosen to Restore Headstones in Center Square

At its Aug. 26 meeting, the Weare Board of Selectmen chose Cornerstone Cemetery Services of Concord to do the restoration work on headstones at Center Square Cemetery on East Road, pending reference checks. Cornerstone had submitted a bid of \$30,000 to do the work. The board also assigned former selectperson Sherry Burdick to oversee the



project. Funding for the work will come from a grant from the Charles and Ethel Eastman Fund. Acceptance of \$35,092 from this fund was approved at an earlier board meeting.

Burdick had spearheaded the project from the beginning by arranging for a company to visit the cemetery and give an estimate of the work to be done and its cost. She then approached the Mildred Hall Committee, which oversees the Eastman Fund, to request funding. Because of the estimated cost of the project, the town's purchasing policy required a bidding process. A Request for Proposals (RFP) was posted on the town website.

Special education teacher



He loved spending time with his family, his girlfriend Sophia, his best friends Jason, Cam, Avery and the dogs. He was a kind and supportive friend to so many of us. He was a great help with building the houses and really worked as hard as he played...and we know he played hard.

He had a great sense of humor. His smile lit up a room and his laugh was absolutely contagious. He was always making jokes and pranking people, but he also had a serious side; like his love of welding and Boy Scouts and the successful landscaping business he had started with his friend, Cam. It was his absolute passion to mow. That wasn't work to him; it was fun. He even bragged about his beautiful lines when a job was completed. Dwight was a very hard-working boy and his work ethic was truly inspiring.

A year ago, Dwight met the love of his life, Sophia. They spent every day of the past 9 1/2 months together. They had a forever kind of love, and she will always be part of the family.

On Monday night at 11:08 p.m., Dwight closed his eyes for just a second, and, as the road curved, he stayed straight. He didn't feel anything; quick and easy. Dwight never made it home. He wasn't speeding; he was wearing his seatbelt and being safe, and everything has been proven by the police investigation.



Safety Tips for Returning College Students

Walk with confidence! And continuously visualize different scenarios in your head...how would you respond to (this and that) situation if it were to happen...right now? Never appear vulnerable or confused when on the go and always think defensively!

1. Park your vehicle in well-lighted areas. When returning, have your key in hand and take a moment to check the interior of your vehicle before opening the door and climbing behind the wheel. Now, lock yourself in!
2. Make it a habit to walk with one or more people.
3. Have a clear plan when going out. Never leave your food or drink unattended.
4. Be aware of any available support services offered through campus security. While these programs do vary, many campuses now have blue lights spread throughout which are equipped with panic buttons to alert police.
5. Keep your dorm room locked. Even if you're going across the hall only for a minute or two. And, keep all other access points to the area secure as well (additional doors, windows, etc).

WindowDressers is a volunteer-run non-profit that helps participants learn to build their own and their neighbors' fuel-saving interior-mounted storm windows **at cost or for free** if they cannot pay.

The Henniker Lions Club and NH Lions Green Team have teamed up with the Canterbury Energy Committee to help people learn to build their own energy saving inserts.

Our "build" will be happening at the Canterbury Town Hall on the **week of Nov. 7**. It is kind of like a barn raising where all the participants come in for a shift or two to help build the inserts. Other volunteers who are not getting inserts also assist and do the teaching.

It is a wonderful project; each insert saves an average of 8.5 gallons of fuel a year and for folks who are able to pay, the inserts typically pay for themselves in two years, all while reducing our carbon footprint.

The Lions are measuring and taking orders for people who live in Weare Henniker, Hopkinton, Hillsboro and Antrim. Please feel free to reach out if you have any questions. **The last day to register is Oct. 4.**

New Instructors, New Learning with LINEC

American landscape painting is familiar to art lovers because of its serene beauty. The Learning Institute of



New England College is pleased to welcome back Inez McDermott, who will teach a mini-course, “The Contemplation of Eternal

Things: Nineteenth Century American Landscape Painting” beginning Oct. 9. She will look at artwork from the Hudson River School and White Mountains. McDermott is a Professor Emeritus at New England College and has taught a LINEC course on paintings of the White Mountains, coordinated with an exhibit she curated at the Currier Museum of Art. This was just one of many exhibits she has curated. The public is invited to join this class by registering at linec.org.

It is one of six in-person offerings in LINEC’s fall lineup, which runs from Oct. 7 to Nov. 15. Unlike formal undergraduate college classes, LINEC is geared to informal senior learning, often offering topics busy adults never had time to explore. There are no quizzes, but plenty of time for questions and discussion led by qualified peers. Other in-person classes include Artificial Intelligence led by Curtiss Rude; Shakespeare’s *Macbeth* led by NEC Professor of Theater Emeritus Glenn Stuart; Food and Faith with Rev. Suzanne Rude; and Don Melander’s viewing and discussion of Ingmar Bergman Films. All these classes meet at the Baker Free Library in Bow. Sign up with a friend and carpool.

The book discussion group meets year-round at Tucker Free Library in Henniker. Every first Wednesday a discussion led by Rev. John McCausland reviews a Booker Prize winning novel.

Zoom courses offer learning and discussion from home. Don Melander, Professor of English Emeritus at New England College, will lead a reading Homer’s *Odyssey*, an epic poem describing Greek warrior Odysseus’s long journey home. New England College Professor Ali Reza Jalili will present The Economy of the Middle East, a late afternoon class. Eric Simon, Professor in NEC’s Biology and Health Science Department, returns with Nature as Consilience of Science and Art: An Ongoing Exploration. Sara Traphagen, familiar with poetry and Civil War medicine, offers Open Heart Surgery: Walt Whitman and Civil War Medicine. Philosophy 101, led by Lisa Melander, bases discussion on selections from Bertrand Russel’s *A History of Western Philosophy*.

LINEC participants often comment that they enjoy exposure to topics other than those they were familiar

with during their careers. Socializing with peers is also a popular reason for registering with LINEC. **Registration closes Sept. 28 for classes beginning in October.** To read full course descriptions and times, and register online see www.linec.org.







The Heroine Perseveres





Animals & Mysteries






However, my husband and I were determined to spend at least part of our retirement making a dent in the Newsweek List of the Top 100 Books – see link below.


