Purchase of North Weare Parcel Approved for Conservation Land

The final approval is in place for the Conservation Commission to go ahead with the purchase of an 85-acre parcel at 487 North Stark Highway for conservation/town forest land. At the Nov. 1 Weare Board of Selectmen's meeting, the board voted 3-2 in favor of moving forward with the project, with Selectmen Burdick, Hippler and Meaney voting yes and Osborne and Van Loendersloot voting no. Hippler participated in the vote by phone.

The board had been deadlocked in previous votes with Selectman Jack Meaney abstaining. Meaney explained that he wanted to see certain contingencies in place before giving his approval. The contingencies included having a trail plan in place within two years, allowing the town the right to any resources on the land, exempt of wood, which goes to the Conservation Commission, and having any buildings on the property removed within 90 days. The commission signed an agreement to that effect with the exception of the mining of resources (meaning gravel). That approval would have to come from voters through a warrant article.


The \$300,000 for the purchase of the parcel, referred to as the Barden property, will come from the Forestry Fund and the Conservation Fund. In March of this year, voters approved a warrant article allowing the expenditure of up to \$140,000 from the Forestry Fund for the purchase of new town forest land.

A public hearing is required before money can be spent from the Conservation Fund. This hearing was held on

Wednesday, Nov. 3. At the hearing, Conservation Commission Vice Chair Steve Najjar explained that the Commission has completed a natural resources inventory and has an open space plan in place for the town. He See LAND, page 2

displayed maps at the hearing that illustrated the multiple features of land that add to its habitat value for wildlife and also explained the importance of large unfragmented blocks of conservation land.

The hearing was sparsely attended with five people speaking in favor of the purchase and two speaking against it. Town Administrator Naomi Bolton had received four letters supporting the project and read those to the commission members.

After the public hearing portion of the meeting, a motion was made to spend \$250,000 from the Conservation Fund toward the purchase of the Barden property. The motion was approved with commission members Steve Najjar, Sherry Burdick, Bill Bolton, Mike Comacho, and Mark Phillips voting in favor. Commission Chairman Andrew Fulton had recused himself from participating in the meeting because his property abuts the land in question.

Finance Committee Holds First Meeting for 2022 Budget Review

The initial meeting of the Weare Finance Committee for the 2022 budget review was held on Oct. 27. Town Moderator Eileen Meaney began the meeting by swearing in two new committee members, Elizabeth Evans and Jeff Spring. She also had each committee member sign the town's Code of Ethics form. Signing the Code of Ethics is a requirement for members of all boards and committees as well as for all town employees.

After having members introduce themselves, Committee Chairman Thomas Downing called for nominations for new officers. Downing was nominated to continue as chair, Megan Thellen as vice chair, and Leah Borla as secretary. Since there were no other nominations, the three will **See FINANCE, page 5**

continue in their respective roles this year. Downing then led a discussion of a member's obligation to the decisions of the committee as well as respecting right-to-know obligations.

An ordinance creating the Weare Finance Committee was first approved by voters in 1929 but has been amended many times since then. The latest amendment was approved by voters in March of 2012. The committee is charged with reviewing all warrant articles, including operating budgets for the Town of Weare, Weare School District, and John Stark Regional School District and making recommendations to voters.

The committee, which is composed of a minimum of 9 but not more than 13 members, is appointed by the town moderator. This year's committee is made up of the following 11 members: Thomas Downing, Megan Thellen, Leah Borla, James Drury, Gary Evans, Neal Kurk, Thomas Clow, William Anderson, Tammi Hagman, Jeff Spring, and Elizabeth Evans.

At the October meeting the committee was divided into three subgroups to attend the meetings of town and school district boards and report back to the group as a whole. The subcommittees are as follows: Town of Weare, Drury, Clow, and Spring; Weare School District, Kurk, Thellen, Hagman, and Anderson; JSRHS, E. Evans, Borla, and G. Evans.

The Finance Committee will meet again on Nov. 17 at 7 p.m. when it will hear a presentation by CIP (Capital Improvement Program) Chairman Jack Dearborn.

1764 is a special date in Weare history. Do you know why?

Weare was incorporated in that year and Governor Benning Wentworth signed the charter. It was also the first year that taxes were collected in Weare. Until the town's incorporation, there was no town government and no taxes were collected!

Would you know Weare by any other name?

When the town was incorporated in 1764, the King of England named the town "Weare" in honor of Meshech Weare, who was one of the proprietors and the first Governor of the State of New Hampshire. However, previous names were "Halestown" and "Robiestown," as determined by earlier proprietors whose efforts to have Weare settled were unsuccessful.

That's right: Weare Center Store has a new name. Since it is a convenience store with thousands of things you might need in a hurry, you will probably" zoom" in, grab what you need, and "zoom" back out – until next time. Of course, if customers have time for a visit, the new owners would love that, too. They are both from small towns in Pennsylvania and Texas and recently realized big city life in Denver, Colorado was not for them. Denise Spence and Darrell Guidry have declared Weare, New Hampshire to be a perfect fit.

They moved here in late July of this year and opened the store on July 25. The store is already very well stocked, but Spence says they are still learning what specific items would most please the town's residents and are happy to have suggestions (see contact information below.)

At this time, Spence and Guidry are the only two employees. The store is open 85 hours per week:

Monday – Thursday, 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.; Friday, 7 a.m. to 9 p.m.; Saturday, 9 a.m. - 9 p.m.; and Sunday, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.. Of course, customers who have stopped in recently may have realized there is one more unpaid and very popular employee on hand to greet customers. "Heis" is the store dog – a six-year-old male Doberman who is very friendly and happy to show people around.

Zoomies has already made a few changes: a new roof, new paint (red, white and blue) and soon-to-be new floors. These will actually be gray planks to better approximate the look of the old country store that is such a part of the building's history.

In addition, they plan to add frozen goods for quick supper pickup. Supporting other local businesspeople is important to Zoomies' owners and they are already offering locally made maple syrup and wine. They will be adding local honey and beef jerky as well, very soon. If you would like the store to carry something you produce locally, see the contact information below. The owners are also excited about plans to introduce more types of food, such as a deli for fresh sandwiches and possibly hot foods as well - at some point in the future. And let's not forget coffee. They will soon be offering locally sourced and fresh-brewed coffee for the morning routine.

When asked about upcoming plans, Spence explained she cannot wait to decorate the store for Christmas, which is her favorite season.

Lastly, the new owners want all to know they very much enjoy meeting the students who come over from the schools across the street. Students and fellow townsfolk are welcome to come in out of the cold and visit for a spell or just grab something and "zoom off."

I have to admit... I like self-help books. I'm always looking for little ways to improve my life. The trouble is, too often, any benefit I get seems short lived. Probably a lack of persistence on my part and no fault of the author's. But this particular book really changed my life!

For example: I had spent two days while my husband, Andy,

was away on a business trip redoing a bedroom as a guest room for his father. (We were trying to encourage him to visit more.)
