Veteran Sergeant Honored; New Officer Hired by Board

A veteran police officer was honored and a new officer

sworn in at the May 8 meeting the Weare Board of of Selectmen. Sergeant Austin Maguire was presented with the Commendation Bar for Meritorious Service for his contributions to the department and the community by Police Chief Christopher Moore. In making presentation, the Moore





reviewed Maguire's history with the department, starting with his hiring in 2013 and his promotion to sergeant in 2016.

After being placed in charge of the department's field training program, Moore said, without being directed, Maguire rewrote the program's policies and procedures, raising the standards of the program to bring it more in line with community expectations of law enforcement by emphasizing community outreach and transparency to improve overall effectiveness.

In 2019, Moore continued, Sergeant Maguire was involved in an officer-involved shooting incident during which a fellow officer was critically injured. As a result of that incident, Maguire recognized the department's need See OFFICERS, page 2

for additional resources regarding the management of stress after being involved in a critical incident, he sought out training opportunities and completed the Critical Incident Stress Foundation's "Assisting Individuals in Crisis and Group Crisis Intervention" course. With that training he developed a program for the department, established policies and procedures, and partnered with neighboring communities to ensure that officers encountering a critical incident have the resources they need. Sergeant Maguire represents the best qualities of the law enforcement profession, Moore said.



Road Reconstruction Projects to Complete Mountain Rd. Area

Abbie Drive, Balch Hill Road and Bartlett Drive are scheduled for reclaim and reconstruction this summer, according to acting Department of Public Works Director Jason Fiske. Reconstruction involves grinding up and reclaiming the old pavement, rebuilding the base and putting down the first layer of new pavement. Rebuilding these three roads will mean that all the roads in the Mountain Road area will have been completed within the last five years, he said. High Rock Road and River Road, from the intersection with Barnard Hill Road approximately to Clough Park Road, will receive a topcoat. Both were reconstructed in 2022. They also intend to seal and chip coat Thorndike Road, he said.

Completing all of these projects depends on how far the money goes and available manpower, Fiske said. The department is down five positions. The estimated cost to completely rebuild one mile of road, including the finish coat of pavement the second year, is \$225,000, he said.

The club expects over 130 show vehicles to vie for the awards.

"We have a lot of repeat attendees which speaks to the popularity of our show," Grady said. "Between sponsor booths, food booths and raffle prizes, there is a lot to keep guests entertained. Goffstown will be hopping that day, with the Goffstown Public Library's book sale, St. Matthew's Episcopal Church's yard sale and our Car Show, so we hope people will visit Goffstown Village and enjoy the day among friends who are all working to support the community."

Proceeds from the event go back to the local community as well as international relief efforts. Last year, the club donated over \$17,000 in cash back to the local area through grants to local non-profits, beautification projects, maintenance of Rotary Park, scholarships to both Goffstown and JSRHS seniors and continuing education students, and support for families in need both in cash and as food collected at food drives. A further \$1,500 was donated to international relief and disaster relief programs. Last year, several of the grants as well as food donations went to Weare-based organizations.

"We want our supporters to be proud of the way their contributions to us make the world a better place for all. This is our biggest fundraiser of the year, and we hope to see a great crowd come to visit with us," Grady said.


