Board Approves Bids for Landfill Repair and Waste Oil Containment

At its Sept. 24 meeting, the Weare Board of Selectmen approved a bid of up to \$131,125 for repairs to the landfill cap by J. Bates & Son. Engineering costs had been \$43,000, so the total for the project will be \$174,125. The motion was intentionally worded "up to" the amount of the bid to allow DPW Director Jason Fiske to negotiate a lower amount if possible. Five different companies attended a site walk at the landfill, but only one bid was received. CMA Engineers is the company that was hired to design the repair and send out a request for proposals (RFP).

Fiske informed the board that, after numerous phone calls, he was able to contact someone at the N.H. Department of Environmental Services (DES). They said that the town can hold off until next year to do the repair, but no one would say one way or the other if fines would be waived. Fiske said that DES informed him that if the town waited until next year, inspections would need to be performed from now until the repair is completed, which would be an added expense. The bid from Bates & Son will be good until next year, Fiske said.

In March of this year, voters approved a warrant article that established a Landfill Repair and Maintenance Capital Reserve Fund and appropriated \$150,000 to be placed in that fund. The remaining \$24,145 will come from the Highway Department Operating Budget as a one-time expense, according to the BOS motion. The board discussed the possibility of using ARPA funds to make up the difference but were informed that ARPA regulations did not allow partial funding of a project.

Secondary Containment for Waste Oil

The board also approved a bid of \$18,210.08 from North Peak Construction & Contracting to construct a secondary containment for waste oil as required by DES. The highway

garage is heated with waste oil, which is stored in 55-gallon drums. The Finance Administrator Beth Rouse told the board that some of the quotes were SEE BOS, page 3

Since both of the above expenditures were approved at a continued session of the Sept. 23 meeting, the board reaffirmed both motions at its regular meeting on Sept. 30.




