Board Sets 2024 Tax Rate; Represents 8.2% Increase

At its Nov. 4 meeting, the Weare Board of Selectmen set the 2024 tax rate at \$20.39, up from \$18.84 in 2023 and representing an increase of 8.2%. The total tax rate breaks down as follows: town \$4.05, local schools tax \$13.84, state-levied school tax \$1.43, county tax \$1.07. The board voted to use \$178,000 from the 2023 unassigned fund balance to help offset the tax increase. This left a 5% retainage in the general fund, which is the minimum amount recommended by the N.H. Department of Revenue Administration (DRA).

According to DRA as stated in the tax-setting material, "Responsible long-term financial planning requires an adequate level of general fund unassigned fund balance to mitigate future risks and ensure stable tax rates." The Government Financial Officers Association suggests municipalities retain between 5% and 17% of regular general fund operating expenditures, also according to DRA. The regular general fund operating expenditure is the total of the town and local schools tax effort plus the amount collected by the town for the state education tax and the county tax. Weare's regular general fund operating expenditures equal \$26,618,488 according to material presented to the BOS by Finance Administrator Beth Rouse.

Finance Committee Holds First Meeting; Flaherty Elected Chair

The Weare Finance Committee held an organizational meeting to kick off its role in the budgeting process for 2025 on Oct. 22. Thomas Flaherty was elected to serve as chairman of the committee, Jessica Kallipolites as vice chair and Bill Anderson as secretary. Other committee members present were Lori Davis, Neal Kurk, Kerry Urie and Michael Koski.

New Town Moderator Dan Wandell opened the meeting by swearing in committee members and having them review and sign the code of ethics and the social media policy. He also reviewed the Finance Committee Ordinance. The ordinance calls for the members to be divided into three subcommittees to attend meetings of the Weare Board of Selectmen, Weare School Board and John Stark School Board and report back to the committee as a whole on budget deliberations by those boards.

Subcommittee assignments are as follows. Town: Tom Flaherty and Kerry Urie. Weare schools: Jessica Kallipolites, Lori Davis, Neal Kurk and Bill Anderson. John Stark: Michael Koski. Members who were not present at the October meeting will be added to the subcommittees as needed.

An ordinance creating the Weare Finance Committee was first approved by voters in 1929 but has been amended many times since then. The latest amendment was approved by voters in March of 2012. The ordinance calls for a committee of at least nine, but not more than thirteen members. The group is charged with reviewing all warrant articles, including operating budgets, for the Town of Weare, Weare School District and John Stark Regional School District and making recommendations to voters.

In the weeks ahead, the committee will hear presentations by the CIP/planning board, all town department heads, and school officials from Weare and John Stark. The next meeting is scheduled for Nov. 26 at 6:30 p.m. in the BOS conference room.

Applying to the Stone Fund

The Joseph Stone Fund was created in 1896 to provide assistance to "widows and unmarried women, who are inhabitants of the Town of Weare, entitled and worthy of aid."

The funds are managed by Weare's Trustees of the Trust Funds and the interest and

earnings are distributed by a committee made up of appointed members of the Town's "religious societies," the Weare Welfare Officer and a representative of the Weare Board of Selectmen, in accordance with the terms of the fund.

To apply to the Stone Fund, you must be a single female resident of Weare and you must complete the application each year. Applications are available from members of the committee or the Weare Welfare Officer. Return the completed application to the president of the Stone Fund Committee (address below), the Weare Welfare Officer or the Weare Selectmen's secretary. The deadline is Nov. 27.

The committee will meet Dec. 3 to review applications. The size of the fund typically results in only a few thousand dollars to give, so the decisions may be highly competitive. Missing information on the application may hinder an applicant's chances. The committee will do its best to determine which applicants are most in need. 
