New Band in Town

On Sunday August 24th, WMS music teacher Serena Gorham led the Weare Area Youth Band in their inaugural concert, <u>Music of the Screen</u>. Attendees were treated to an enjoyable selection of music from the silver screen, including Star Wars, Indiana Jones, Jurassic Park and many more.

The band features members from the communities of Weare, Deerfield, Derry, the Kearsarge region, and Manchester; two students from UNH and Manchester Community College, and four professional musicians.

The idea to start a community band is not the first attempt for Ms. Gorham, but it is the first to come to

fruition. This concert served as a fundraiser for the music program at WMS. In the upcoming 2025-2026 school year, the WMS band will have 123 members while the WMS choir will have 140 members. These numbers don't include Beginning band and choir for 4th and 5th graders.

"This means we need things like reeds, instruments, chairs, and risers," Ms. Gorham shared in a Facebook post in which she announced the music program's fall fundraiser - an online pasta sale.




