Outdoor Ropes Course to Return to John Stark Regional High School

John Stark Regional High School will re-introduce the outdoor ropes course in the spring of 2022 in outdoor leadership and physical education classes.

"Until it was paused by COVID, outdoor ropes and adventure learning had been a continuous thread in a John Stark education since the beginning," said PE teacher Deb Apiki in a school release. "The ropes course builds a sense of community that really no other activity can do and teaches about taking healthy risks, which is a hard concept to convey. Students discover newfound self-esteem and confidence in these classes."

Built on progression, students must take low ropes in

Proposed Weare Town Budget and Draft of Warrant Reviewed

The Board of Selectmen reviewed the Town of Weare 2022 proposed operating budget and a first draft of the Town Warrant at its meeting on Jan. 3. Town Administrator Naomi Bolton then presented the budget to the Finance Committee on Jan. 5, along with Fire Rescue Chief Robert Vezina, Police Chief Christopher Moore and Library Director Clay Kriese. The proposed budget of \$7,464,993 is 4.6% higher than the budget approved for 2021 and 3.38% higher than the default budget of \$7,227,983.

In an SB2 town like Weare, where voters go to the polls to vote on the budget and warrant articles (as opposed to a traditional town meeting), the town must operate on a default budget if voters do not approve the proposed budget.

Many of the articles on the draft warrant are the same, or similar to those in prior years. These include an article for raises of 3% for non-union employees, as well as articles for raises for library employees and for returning Parks and Recreation staff. Both the library and Parks and Recreation are asking for \$1 per hour increases.

Fire Rescue is proposing to hire two additional full-time firefighter/EMTs. This will complete the department's plan to have eight full-timers and allow for 24/7 coverage at the fire station. Fire Rescue will also be proposing the purchase of a new ambulance with funding for this coming from the Fire

Department Equipment and Vehicle Special Revenue Fund.

Other familiar articles include a fully equipped cruiser for the Police Department, a 10-wheel dump truck and a one-ton truck for DPW, as well as the annual road reconstruction article, part of which is paid for through a N.H. Highway Block Grant. There will also be an article from DPW asking to establish a special revenue fund for Transfer Station equipment using 50% of recycling revenues.

There will be an article on the warrant to see if the town will establish a capital reserve fund to begin funding an update to the master plan and to place \$20,000 in that fund. A town's master plan is supposed to be updated every ten years, and Weare's was last done in 2005.

The Conservation Commission has submitted two articles: one to hire a licensed forester, with the money to come from the Town Forest account (this is an article submitted annually) and the second is to designate two town-owned parcels of land as conservation land to be managed by the Conservation Commission.

There will be two articles on the warrant dealing with emergency services communication. One will ask voters to approve the Weare Fire Rescue Department joining Capital Area Mutual Aid Fire Dispatch. The second will ask voters to authorize a lease agreement for all of the equipment for a Town Radio Communication Network for Safety Services. The Board of Selectmen are still working on the details of this article, so there will be a more thorough explanation of what this network entails, and the financing option chosen when that work is complete.

Finally, there will be an article on the warrant asking if the town shall adopt the provisions of RSA 72: 28-b, All Veterans' Tax Credit. Presently, the town gives a \$500 tax credit to veterans who served during specific times of combat specified under RSA 72:28. Adoption of this article would expand that tax credit to include all veterans who served not less than 90 days on active duty.

There is a public hearing on the town budget and warrant scheduled for Jan. 17, at 7 p.m. at the Town Office Building. Deliberative Session is Saturday, Feb. 12, at 9 a.m. at the Weare Middle School. Amendments to warrant articles can be made at the Deliberative Session.

Please note that this news article references a draft of the town warrant dated 1-3-2022. For that reason, the dollar amounts for individual warrant articles have not been included. Changes may be made to any of the warrant articles before they are finalized.

The school spelling bees were held the first week in January with former Weare District and SAU 24 Board Chair Marge Burke (also a




member of the WITW staff) as the judge.

Hunter's winning word was "mournful" and Haddie's word was "contorted." Both students will move on to the local spelling bee on Feb. 26 in Concord.





Scholarship for Motorcycle Enthusiasts to Honor Matthew Riley

A local scholarship in honor of a Weare veteran is being offered to those looking to further their education in motorbike mechanics.

Matthew Robert John Riley was a loving friend, brother, son, veteran and motorcycle enthusiast. From a young age, he was always tinkering on cars, leading him to pursue a degree at the University of Northwestern Ohio. He spent many years as an auto mechanic before enlisting in the United States Army. After suffering injuries that ultimately ended his military career, Matt made the decision to change his career path and follow his dreams.

He moved to Florida and went back to school, this time for motorcycle mechanics. Unfortunately, due to the lack of financial resources, he could not finish his education. He then moved back to New Hampshire and began working his way up with the education he had. Riley worked at several local area garages.

On May 1, 2021, after a fun-filled and loving day with friends and family, Riley was tragically lost in a motorcycle accident. Those closest to him decided the best way to honor his memory would be with a scholarship aiding those looking to further their education in motorcycle mechanics.

Transfer Station Fees Increased; Year-End Expenditures Approved

Following a public hearing on Dec. 27, the Weare Board of Selectmen approved several changes to the Transfer Station fee schedule to become effective Jan. 1, 2022. The cost to dispose of passenger car tires was increased from \$3 to \$4, plus an extra \$2 if the tire contains dirt. Most pickup truck tires are considered passenger car size. The cost to dispose of truck tires was increased from \$15 to \$20, plus an additional \$10 if they contain dirt. Tires on 17.5 inch or larger rims are considered truck tires.

The disposal fee for motorcycle tires was raised from \$2 to \$4, plus an extra \$2 if there's dirt in them. The fee for snowmobile tracks was increased from \$20 to \$25. The only other change was for propane tanks. Any tank from 5 lbs. to 60 lbs. will cost \$3 each for disposal. The charge on helium tanks has been eliminated. A complete list of transfer station fees can be found on the town of Weare website, www.weare.nh.gov. Click on "departments," and then on "Transfer Station" in the drop-down menu. All fees collected to dispose of specific items go into a revolving fund that is used exclusively to pay vendors to take this material.

The board also approved raising the sticker fee for commercial haulers from \$100 to \$200 per year. There are presently five commercial haulers in Weare, according to DPW Director Benji Knapp.

Year-End Expenditures Approved

At the same meeting, selectmen finalized approval of \$277,299.53 in year-end expenditures from the 2021 budget. This included \$11,500 for a second electronic message board for the Department of Public Works and \$10,000 for renovations to the bathroom and office at the Transfer Station. The Police Department received funding for \$50,199.53 for a variety of equipment, some of which were tactical and protective items that were reaching the end of their life cycle. \$165,600 will be spent on the Fire Department and Town Office. Some of the major items here include LED lights, AC replacement with HEPA filters, air purifiers, reverse osmosis water treatment systems for the Safety Complex, library, DPW garage, and Town Hall, water bottle filling stations to eliminate the need to purchase bottled water, and diagnostic testing and parts replacement on the present police/fire rescue radio system including replacing VHF antennas on Mine Hill.

The board also encumbered \$40,000 to replace the vehicle for the Building Department. The present vehicle is a 2006 pickup truck. There will be a public hearing held on Jan. 24, before a new vehicle is purchased.

Tidbits of Weare History

An occasional feature by the Weare Historical Society

This week by Deb Chase, director.

In days gone by, how were people able to travel around Weare during the winter?

The snow roller was introduced and bought in 1890 to make a smoother snow road for horse- and ox-drawn sleds and sleighs. As many as three pairs of oxen or four pairs of horses were used on a roller. When automobiles arrived in Weare, these rolled roads were usable for them if the cars stayed on the packed roadbeds. Change came in 1926. Read more about it in the "Town History of Weare from 1888" by Helen Dearborn.



The first car came to Weare in 1905, and in 1919 the first garage in Weare was built and owned by Maurice Grant; it was called the South Weare Garage. It burned in 1926 and then was rebuilt. Leon Grant, Maurice's brother, took over the garage. The building still stands today on the corner of routes 77 and 149.
