Let me remind you, if you have readers on your Christmas list, you have plenty of options with our very talented local authors:

As promised, let's continue with the items written by our versatile author – Ellen Reed. (*Have you ever considered why it is so much fun to read Dr. Seuss to our little ones? I believe it is because he writes for both the child and the adult and captures 2 VERY different audiences with each work.*) Such is also the case with Ellen Reed. She wrote The Unicorn Keeper and Monsters Level 1, 2, & 3 series for her grandchildren age 10. But, I have read them more than once and there is laughter for adult readers in every chapter.

I have a soft spot for historical fiction. Many of you are familiar with the plays based on books by Connie Evans. This gifted author creates scenes so real, you will be nervous until the villain leaves, hungry while dinner cooks, proud while our neighbors go off to save the fledgling nation. The research and attention to detail has palpable results in all of Evans' work.

One of our most eloquent authors – Kevin Lane – also has multiple categories. There is fantasy, young adult, a story on bullying – based on true events - and more. He is also a gifted artist who does his own illustrations.

Have you ever wondered if Route 101 was haunted? There are rumors – and a book based on them for those who like mystery. The book is by our own J.S. MacEachern. Well researched and full of local history.

How about a story about vacation homes and all that can go wrong or right with them. This one – The House in Maine, Curse of 7 - is also set on the Maine coast and based on true events. It is written by Debbie Kruenegel-Farr.

Lastly, we have a very special children's book written by our author Karen Coulters and her granddaughter Riley Coker about a fairy with a broken wing. This too is beautifully illustrated and may become a family keepsake book.

Weare's First Annual Top Dog Raffle

Did you know that almost 2,700 dogs call Weare home? And, that under NH RSA 466:1, every dog four months or older shall be licensed annually in the clerk's office of the town in which the dog is kept?

NH dog licenses are effective from May 1st to April 30th of the next year, regardless of when the initial license was issued. An owner whose dog is not licensed by June 1st will be subject to a \$25 civil forfeiture fee as well as a \$1 per month late fee.

To encourage residents to license their dogs between **January 1st and April 30th**, we are excited to announce Weare's First Annual Top Dog Raffle. Special thanks go to our local sponsors - **Balboni's Landscaping, Dunkin Donuts, Food Not Bombs of New Hampshire, Ilsley's Ice Cream, Marc Phillips Automotive, TandemKross and TMS Diesel**. We will have three gift baskets filled with treats for humans and canines alike. Each household that licenses their dog or dogs before April 30th, will get a ticket to enter. Winners will be selected on Friday, May 1st and will be notified by the Town Clerk.

In order to be eligible for an entry ticket:

- You must be a Weare resident, and dogs need to be licensed between January 1st and April 30th, either online or in person at the clerk's office.
- A valid rabies certificate must be on file upon licensing. We will be holding a rabies clinic on March 19th from 5:30-7:00 at the Old Town Hall.
- Entries are limited to one ticket per household, regardless of the number of canine residents.

Fire Chief Roarick stopped by the Center and shared important information concerning fire safety during the winter months. His handouts and engaging conversation made an impact and could help to save life and property.

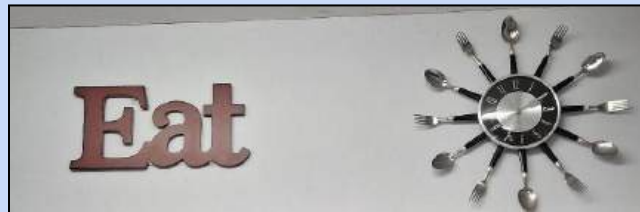
We have Christmas Dinner on Christmas Day (Thursday, December 25th) at 1 p.m. Sign up at the Center or call so we know how many to plan for.

A treat I will never forget

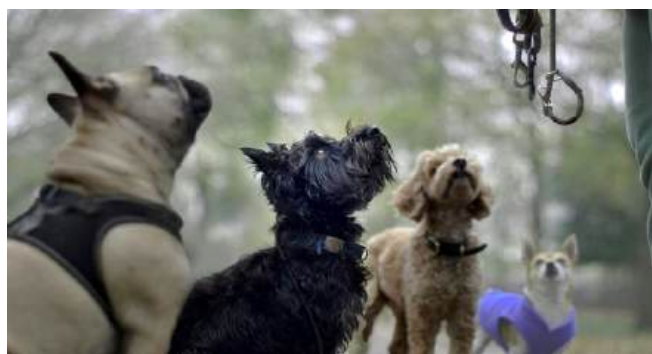
