## Board Sets 2025 Tax Rate; Represents 6.1% Increase



At a special meeting at 8:00 a.m. on November 12, the Weare Board of Selectmen (BOS) set the 2025 tax rate at \$21.64 per thousand, representing a 6.1% increase over the 2024 rate. The total rate breaks down as follows: town \$3.90; schools \$15.00; state education tax \$1.44; and county \$1.30. In order to keep the increase at that level, the selectmen used \$385,000 from 2024 unassigned fund balance. This action left a 5% retainage in the general fund, which is the minimum amount recommended by the NH Department of Revenue Administration (DRA).

According to the DRA, as stated in the tax-setting material: "Responsible long term financial planning requires an adequate level of general fund unassigned fund balance to mitigate future risks and ensure stable tax rates." The Government Financial Officers Association suggests municipalities retain between 5% and 17% of regular general fund operating expenditures, also according to the DRA. The regular general fund operating expenditure is the total of the town and local schools tax effort plus the amount collected by the town for the state education tax and the county tax. Weare's regular general fund operating expenditures equal \$28,521,675 according to material presented to the BOS by Finance Administrator Beth Rouse.

## Weare's Annual Top Dog Raffle

Did you know that almost 2,700 dogs call Weare home? And, that under NH RSA 466:1, every dog four months or older shall be licensed annually in the clerk's office of the town in which the dog is kept?

NH dog licenses are effective from May 1st to April 30th of the next year, regardless of when the initial license was issued. An owner whose dog is not licensed by June 1st will be subject to a \$25 civil forfeiture fee as well as a \$1 per month late fee.

To encourage residents to license their dogs between **January 1st and April 30th**, we are excited to announce Weare's First Annual Top Dog Raffle. Special thanks go to our local sponsors - **Balboni's Landscaping, Dunkin Donuts, Food Not Bombs of New Hampshire, Ilsley's Ice Cream, Marc Phillips Automotive, TandemKross and TMS Diesel**. We will have three gift baskets filled with treats for humans and canines alike. Each household that licenses their dog or dogs before April 30th, will get a ticket to enter. Winners will be selected on Friday, May 1st and will be notified by the Town Clerk.

In order to be eligible for an entry ticket:

- You must be a Weare resident, and dogs need to be licensed between January 1st and April 30th, either online or in person at the clerk's office.
- A valid rabies certificate must be on file upon licensing. We will be holding a rabies clinic on March 19th from 5:30-7:00 at the Old Town Hall.
- Entries are limited to one ticket per household, regardless of the number of canine residents.



## BOOKS !!

### For Christmas

### Part One

I want to take a minute to remind you that if you are buying books this Christmas, you have so many excellent options for supporting local authors. After all, before they were famous, John Grisham and Nora Roberts were “local authors” sending works off to their publishers with fingers crossed.

Many of the folks in the Weare Area Writers Guild are equally talented – they are just, as yet, undiscovered. 😊 I think you will be amazed at what is available to you.

Let me first address what I think is one of the most important works offered. Marge Burke has written an amazing trilogy on Alzheimer's that follows the journey she and her husband endured. It begins with the very rare perspective of her husband when he was first diagnosed and progresses through his care in a nursing home, hospice, and her eventual adjustments to the loss. I can not stress enough how unique and helpful these books are. Although the topic is certainly depressing, amazingly, her books are NOT. She walks you through day by day with concrete suggestions for how to cope and how to maintain love in the face of such an adversary. We are blessed to have such a brilliant author in our own little town. Her books – including several other works – are available at local booksellers and at her website [www.marjorieburke.com](http://www.marjorieburke.com).

All the other books I will mention are available at Amazon and usually local book sellers as well.

Another very popular author in our group is Karen Coulters. She writes delightful, light romance novels set in York, Maine. As promised, each book ends on a positive note, and folks especially enjoy the highlights of York that are featured within the pages.

If you want some education with your romance, then consider the Sugar Sun series by Jennifer Hallock. These are set in the Philippines where the author has lived for a time and are wonderfully accurate as to historical events. But, be aware, these are definitely PG-13.

Now here is something with a twist. How about science fiction with a humorous bent? David Collins is a retired software engineer who has jumped to favored status on Amazon with over 33 books published so far. For your electronic readers, his books are usually very inexpensive or free on Kindle unlimited. Like all science fiction, most of

them make you stop and think. Unlike most science fiction, they also make you laugh.

The most versatile author in our group is Ellen Reed. She is what some would call a multimodal super competent. She has written historical fiction about the first murder in Henniker, ghost hunting stories, murder mysteries with a New England theater group setting, and her sense of humor is evident everywhere. I know those of us in the Weare Area Writers Guild are especially fond of the distinct characters she creates. If you are lucky enough to catch a reading from her, each person is presented with full on accents – delightful. Reed is so versatile that I will continue in Part 2 with more of her work.

## Tai Ji at Senior Center

It's said that with age comes wisdom. While that may or may not be true, age brings changes to the body. Besides

stiffness and inflexibility, there's loss of muscle mass, decreased bone density, less skin elasticity, slower reflexes, and a change in gait and posture. Not to mention brain fog! A healthier diet, better rest, and particularly exercise are all helpful. But even the most active people feel the changes of aging.

So, when I started feeling the aging effects, including joint replacements, I knew I had to make adjustments to my exercise routine. Heavy weightlifting, hard martial arts, and running were out; lighter weights, walking, and yoga took their place in my life, but I missed the challenge of martial arts. I looked into Tai Chi, and for a while, took some classes. But my work schedule changed, and I was unable to continue. There were no other twice weekly Tai Chi options available, so I resumed my alternate regimen.

I never really gave up looking for Tai Chi, and luckily, something very close to home became available. On January 28, 2025, I took the literal first step. Thanks to the hard work of Heleen Kurk, a volunteer at the Weare Senior Center, Tai Ji Quan: "Moving for Better Balance" (tjqmbb) came to our town.

This program was developed by Dr. Fuzhong Li and uses a scientific approach to improving balance and preventing falls. It's taught by Weare resident Sandy Turcotte, who has first degree black belts in the Korean martial arts of Taekwondo and Hapkido.

Turcotte explains, "I started practicing martial arts at 19, during college, while studying health and fitness, and, after school, took a break to have a family. I spent 30 years full time in the field of fitness and taught many group exercise classes, therapeutic classes, personal training and coaching. My specialty was, and is, seniors. I started teaching Tai Ji Moving for Better Balance about 10 years ago. I taught at the Granite YMCA and offsite community programs for the Y".

The difference between traditional Tai Chi and this program is that Tai Ji "Moving for Better Balance" is an evidence based therapeutic program designed to improve balance and physical function, preventing falls. This program adapts traditional Tai Chi principles into a program focusing on functional training. Traditional Tai Chi encompasses martial arts and meditation and is a broad practice with goals that can vary from self-defense to general fitness.

Turcotte goes on to explain that "The outcome of Tai Ji "Moving for Better Balance" is that this program has been

proven in effectively reducing the frequency of falls and improving balance in individuals and helping them feel less fearful of falling. I ended up at the Weare Senior Center because I wanted to bring this fantastic program to the individuals that I feel needed it most being in a rural setting. I wanted my community, the one I live in, to benefit from this program and not have to travel so far to get it. I felt like our town could benefit from this life changing program tremendously. This program in my opinion is essential to the health and well-being of older adults."

Turcotte also says she's had countless people tell her how this program has changed their lives for the better. "For some it's been the difference of having a walker and then not having one. For some it's the confidence that it brings into their lives where they feel like they can walk down the stairs without holding the railing. That is life transforming."

The program is open for the first three weeks, but after that is a cutoff point because it is a progressive program; it starts off easy and ends up at a progressively stronger pace. The program is twice a week for one hour at a time and runs for 24 weeks. Currently it is grant funded, so there is no cost for participants, although this could change in the future.

Turcotte emphasizes the importance of listening to your body. "If you are noticing balance issues don't wait. Take care of yourselves, eat healthy, get good quality sleep, drink water, keep stress down and exercise with classes like Tai Ji Moving for Better Balance. It's never too late to start taking care of yourself!"
