Plans for Library Expansion Presented at Public Meeting

conceptual drawings were the first step in a long process. The plans as presented would approximately double the floor space of the library and would extend into the area between the present building and the Stone Memorial Building.

There were several questions raised by those at the meeting, including a concern about parking spaces and a main entrance near the American Legion Hall, since that is already a busy area. There was also a question about roof design, asking if the addition could have a hip roof to match the old part of the library and the Stone Building. The color of the bricks shown in the drawings was questioned; however, LaCombe said that would not be the color used for the building, it would be like those on the present building. Concerning cost, LaCombe said the project would be in the area of \$5.2 million and would require a substantial fundraising effort.

Library Director Clay Kriese opened the meeting by introducing the library trustees and members of the See LIBRARY, page 2



Winning Scholarships

By Chris Hague June 6 was a celebratory evening at John Stark Regional

High School. After being canceled during the Covid outbreak, a public awards night returned to honor graduating seniors with scholarships.

The Eleanor Campbell Charitable Fund awarded scholarships to 12 college-bound students. These young people were selected from 108 applicants for qualities much like the fund's namesake, Dr. Campbell, exemplified nearly a hundred years ago. As an heiress living in Manhattan, she could have spent her life doing other things than earning a medical degree, opening health clinics for New York's immigrant populations and local women in Deering, and founding the Deering Community Center, where families could enjoy recreation and cultural events.

From the small private foundation she established in 1932, the fund has expanded and renamed itself, awarding \$40,500 this spring to students from John Stark and Hillsboro-Deering High Schools, as well as to students already in college. Selection continues to be based on academic excellence, community engagement and financial need, as it has been since the fund's inception.

The Tyrell Award for a prospective business student was given to Olivia Hargreaves. Other scholarships were awarded to Samantha Veilleux, Natalie Smith, Katelyn Pinter, Sophia McGinty, Loren Ballou, Kiera Briggaman, Jacqueline O'Donnell, Kadie Forrestall, Logan Grant, Ruby Dykstra and Emma Dobbins.

The Eleanor Campbell Charitable Fund's Board of Directors congratulates the class of 2023, and thanks the members of the public whose contributions enable the fund to continue the work Dr. Campbell began.

Being Present with the Past – Walking the Brook

The brook has dwindled to mostly a rock bed and as I watch

the slender stream dividing and joining, going in and out, searching for passages to some far away destination I remember how once I waited for just such a diminished waterway when I was a child. That is when I would tell my mother that I was going to walk the brook. Boulders and rocks would have taken on new shapes without the spring torrent surging over them. Little mossy gardens and a miniature fern forest had crowned some of them, an occasional leopard frog leaped before me, his spots glistening jewel-like in the sunlight. My bare toes clung to the rocks as I made my way downstream, stopping occasionally to test a pool. Even in late summer the water was cold and soothing to summer blisters and scrapes.

This time of year I would also be looking for the cardinal flower often found along the way. Lobelia cardinalis: a member of the bell family and a subfamily of the lobelia. This slender spike of intense scarlet was a delight found on the



stream bank as I slipped and slid over rocks barely veiled with water. Often only a single stalk of this brilliant flower could be found and its solitary presence matched my own being, this particular highway mine alone.

Eventually the brook would widen and deepen; my journey would take me through the woods to the road where others traveled. I had resisted picking the cardinal flower to bring to my mother, its stature so brave, blooming there alone, but blackberries hung over the sides of the road toward home. My pockets and hands were full as I passed the barn, its loft overflowing now with hay. Mother was making pies in the kitchen, and she handed me a bit of dough to fold around the berries. Soon the baked pies along with my little blackberry one were set to cool in front of the open window, their freshness mingling with the scent of phlox by the door.
