Above is the official emblem of the American Legion Auxiliary. The emblem of the American Legion Auxiliary was created not long after it was formed. It is similar to the American Legion itself, but remains distinct. The emblem is displayed as a badge of honor representing volunteer service, support for military families and Americanism.

As with most emblems, each part of the design has a specific meaning. The rays of the sun represent loyalty, justice, freedom and democracy - shining a light to clear away the darkness. The unbroken circle of blue stands for unity and loyalty among members. The white field space shows the pure hope of freedom. Lastly, the blue star honors military service during war and peaceful times as well. Taken all together the logo represents the Auxiliary's dedication to the community, state and nation and support of our veterans.

**September 1-7<sup>th</sup>** the American Legion and the Auxiliary highlight the importance of mental health among our military members with our "BE THE ONE" initiative. The focus of this is to encourage family members, legion members, veterans, and all service members to reach out when they feel a veteran or service member may be in crisis.

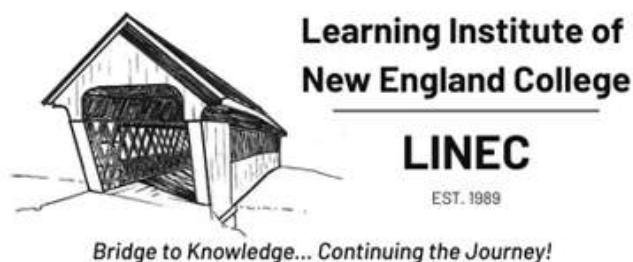
**Volunteers Needed!**

## LINEC: A Lively Lineup

Energetic, enthusiastic instructors play as much of a role as topics in attracting participants to Learning Institute of New England College courses. A survey following the spring term cited LINEC volunteer instructors' knowledge and ability to stimulate discussion as important in course selection. Space doesn't permit details about every instructor but snapshots of a few preview what's ahead for LINEC's October lineup.

Film productions of Shakespeare plays come alive in Glenn Stuart's six-week classes. Stuart, a retired NEC Professor of Theatre Emeritus, has an astonishing knowledge of drama, including Shakespeare's works. "Immortal Longings: Caesar, Cleopatra and Mark Anthony" will look at a story that emerges in both plays.

Eric Simon is a professor in the Department of Biology and Health at NEC and a travel guide on biology-themed trips. He's offering "Yosemite: A Cultural, Scientific, Political and Artistic Nexus of America" online. He combines elements of history, arts and politics of the time with details about biology in a way lay people grasp and discuss. Class sessions are always lively as he brings new, unfamiliar details to familiar topics.

Once discovered, LINEC participants return to more of Sarah Traphagen's online classes. She combines intrigue and mystery with history to bring little-known events to light through literature. With a doctorate in English, she is known as a poet and award-winning educator. This fall "Mill Girl Confidential" will explore the story of Sarah Furber, a young mill girl who began work for the Amoskeag Manufacturing Company in 1848. This electronic course will look into Sarah's death as well as the lives of mill girls.

LINEC looks forward to another presenter best known to the Weare Writers Group and "Weare in the World." Sharon Czarnecki will lead "Memoir Writing," a subject popular when it was last offered decades ago, and requested since then as times change and family and friends value descriptions of a life.

LINEC's fall session begins October 5. Other offerings include "Epic Poetry: Milton's Paradise Lost" and "Women in Philosophy," meeting electronically. "Proteins, Fiber and Fat, Oh My!" and "Symmetry in Nature" meet in person. Details of six-week classes are available at [www.linec.org](http://www.linec.org)

Five groups meet once in October. An ongoing first Wednesday book discussion will explore Ernest Hemingway novels. The second Thursday Science and Technology Discussion Group chooses its own topics. Friday groups include "Two Great Floods" [1936 and 1938] at the Henniker Historical Society, "The Math-Art of Paper Folding," "Poetry Writing," and an online presentation by the Smithsonian American Art Museum, "William H. Johnson: Fighter for Freedom."

Browse online at [www.linec.org](http://www.linec.org) to learn more and to register. LINEC classes are anything but pedantic. Whether it's science, literature, history or a combination of topics, the subject matter brings people together with lively sharing of similar interests. Courses are open to retirees and anyone else available during class times. Registration closes September 25.

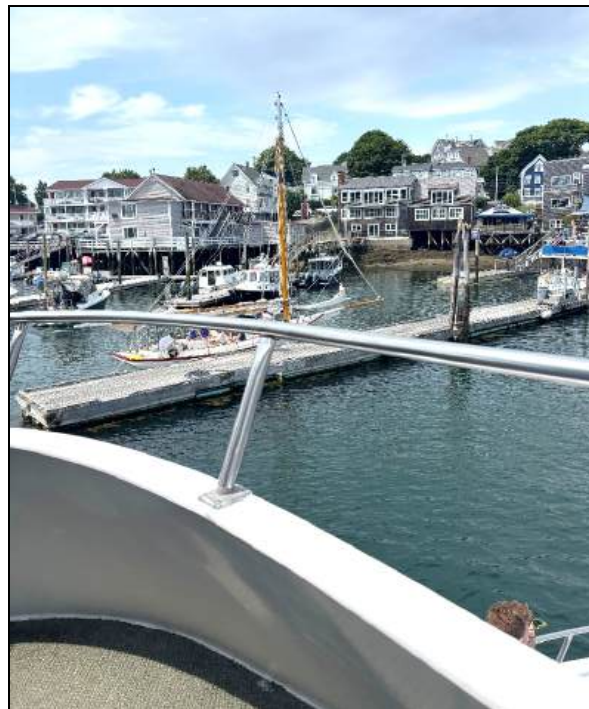
