

Assistant Library Director Honored at Retirement Party

About 25 people came by the Weare Public Library on Aug. 3 to enjoy cake and coffee and to say thank you and good-bye to Assistant Library Director Thelma Tracy on her last day before retirement. During the last 15 years, Tracy has served as assistant to three directors: Christine Hague, Michael Sullivan and present director Clay Kriese. She reminisced about her time at the Weare Public Library, saying that it was a job she loved. The library really gets into your heart, she said.

Tracy carried the library through some difficult times. With the sudden passing of Sullivan in 2019, she found herself in charge until a new director was hired. When the present volunteer staff of *Weare in the World* took on the responsibility for

Fire Chief Recognizes Veteran Members; Reports on Transition Process

In a presentation to the Weare Board of Selectmen on July 24, Interim Fire Rescue Chief Christopher Olsen recognized the long-term service of four members of the department. Olsen shared letters of thanks and recognition presented to Robert Richards for 41+ years with the department, David Hewey for 38+ years, Scott Dinsmore for 38+ years and Frederick (Rick) Hippler for 20 years. The recognition was part of restructuring and transition within the department, he said.

In March of this year, voters approved a warrant article that eliminates the Board of Fire Wards and turns that group's responsibilities over to the Board of Selectmen effective in March of 2024. Olsen said he is beginning the transition process now by sharing the same report with the BOS that he prepares for the Board of Fire Wards.

He distributed packets for the board members to review, which he said included reports on personnel, an update on the budget, a review of the ambulance billing service and activities the department has done for the community. It also included reports on the facilities, apparatus and maintenance, as well as any other budget issues, he said. In the future he would be working through the town administrator to bring this material to the board, Olsen said.

New Campbell Fund Board Members

At the July 21 annual meeting of the Eleanor A. Campbell Charitable Fund Board of Directors, Jerry Little of Weare and Libby Dutton of Deering were confirmed as new board members.

Jerry Little and his wife Heidi moved to Weare in 2005. Educated in Concord schools and the University of New Hampshire, he worked in broadcast journalism and politics, followed by two decades of business trade association management. He served two years in the N.H. Senate and finally six years as State Banking Commissioner. Jerry also served on the Weare Public Library Foundation, as town and school district moderator and as a member of the Weare Capital Improvements Committee.

Libby Dutton lives on a farm owned by generations of Duttons in Deering. She is a graduate of Smith College and

holds a Masters Degree in Business Administration from Southern New Hampshire University. Libby has experience in higher education administration and is currently the Bursar at New England College. Her most significant role, she says, is bringing up three preschool age children in the family home.

Also at the annual meeting, outgoing board members Sara Carter and Don Johnson of Deering were recognized. Don served as a board member for over five decades, at one time its president. He was conferred emeritus status by unanimous vote.

As an example of how aid to education matters, Don received one of the first scholarships, given to him by Dr. Campbell herself. His education began in a one room schoolhouse. By the time he retired, he was a professor at New York University.

The Campbell board oversees funding and granting of scholarships to high school seniors and college students. While its namesake, Dr. Eleanor Campbell, began her charitable work almost a hundred years ago when she came to Deering and started a health clinic, the fund now includes public donations in its budget. In the fund's fiscal year just ended, community donations totaled over \$5,000. The board recognized with appreciation this valued giving. Squam Lake Nighthawks Lecture

A New Hampshire Endangered Species, By Rebecca Suomala of N.H. Audubon

Nighthawks are endangered in New Hampshire and declining throughout their range, but we don't know why. The dawn and dusk "peent" call of these birds was once a familiar sound in cities and towns throughout New Hampshire, where they nested on flat, pea stone gravel roofs and fed on insects attracted to city lights. The N.H. Audubon initiated Project Nighthawk in 2007 to investigate the potential for restoring nesting nighthawks by placing simple gravel "nest patches" on flat rooftops.
