Lundeen Named First-Ever Educational Support Professional of the Year

Weare Middle School's Kristen Lundeen has been named the 2024 Educational Support Professional of the Year, the first time this honor has been presented, according to a

school release.



Lundeen will be recognized with all the 2024 EDies Award recipients at the Excellence in Education Award Ceremony (EDies) at the DoubleTree by Hilton Manchester Downtown on June 8. The National Education Association of New Hampshire (NEA-NH) is the sponsoring organization of the award.

Lundeen is a Registered Behavior Technician (RBT) and Paraprofessional II at WMS. She began as a paraprofessional in 2016 and has continued as both a para and RBT at the school since earning her RBT certification in 2020.

"Kristen is such a passionate and caring professional who desires the best outcome for all students in our community," said Principal Jon Barry in the release. "It is no surprise to me or anyone at WMS that she would be chosen for and receive this honor," Principal Barry continued.

Town Is Seeking Volunteers for Many Boards and Committees

Article 25, submitted by petition, on the 2024 town of Weare warrant, asked voters to limit the ability to serve as an appointed member of a committee to two consecutive terms. There was other language as well specifying that a person would then have to wait three years before being reappointed. The article was amended at the deliberative session to read as follows:

"To see if the town will vote to study restricting eligibility for appointed positions to Town Boards and Committees to two (2) consecutive terms, which shall include any part of a term served, and shall remain ineligible for the next succeeding three (3) years?" Despite the town attorney cautioning that the restriction could not apply to positions created by state statute, the article, as amended, passed by a margin of 959 to 870.

Ironically, less than one month later, a posting appears on the homepage of the town website requesting volunteers for a number of committees. See VOLUNTEERS, page 2, for the full listing.



Of Blisters and Tool Handles

I have a few tools older than 100 years and many that are 40 to 50 years old. Several years ago, I was getting blisters from using my garden hoe. The handle had weathered and long cracks ran along the length of the handle; the blade was fine. I decided to improve the handle with electrical tape. This tape is very inexpensive, but I worried that it would not last a season. It is in fine shape three years later. I began wrapping all my old handles showing split or rough handles.



I assume that most of the longer handles will be worked and left in the weather with the blade down, so I start my tape at or near the head and work the tape to near the end of the handle. Rain is less likely to enter under the tape.

In the example in the photos, you can see that I overlap the tape about half the width of

the tape. I keep tension on the tape as I wrap but do not stretch it. Be sure to use a blade to cut the tape from the roll when done wrapping



and smooth the last inch of tape to the handle without touching the tacky side.
