## Matthew Colby Named SAU 24 Assistant Superintendent

## **Board Hears Cemetery Plan; Continues Work on Town Budget**

The Cemetery Advisory Committee presented a five-year plan for cemetery improvements to the Weare Board of Selectmen at the Dec. 2 BOS meeting. The plan calls for focusing the first year on Eaton, Sugar Hill and Oil Mill Cemeteries. The work will include headstone cleaning and repairs at all three cemeteries and fencing repairs at the Sugar Hill site. This advisory committee, recently established by the Board of Selectmen, includes Thomas Flaherty, Sherry Burdick, Mike Zienkiewicz and BOS Chair Janice Mathews. Flaherty presented the five-year plan at the BOS meeting.

In past years, the job of evaluating cemetery needs and placing articles on the town warrant to meet those needs had fallen to the cemetery trustees; however, the trustees were elected officials, and in recent years no one has run for those offices. This resulted in the selectmen taking on the responsibilities of the cemetery trustees. The last annual report from cemetery trustees appeared in the 2020 Weare Town Report.

The need for additional help overseeing the town's cemeteries became apparent through the efforts of former selectman Sherry Burdick, who headed an evaluation of conditions at Center Square Cemetery on East Road that identified 163 headstones as damaged or displaced. Burdick secured a grant of \$35,092 from the Charles and Ethel Eastman Fund for the repairs at Center Square.

#### **Town Budget Nears Completion**

Also at the Dec. 2 meeting, the board heard budget presentations from library director Clay Kriese and a wrap-up of smaller department budgets from finance administrator Beth Rouse. This completed budget presentations from all departments. The material will be put together into one municipal budget summary for a public hearing scheduled for January 20. The 2025 Town Deliberative Session will be held on Feb. 1.

Congratulations to JSRHS graduate ('24) Eli Lemire, who



won the USCAA National Cross Country Championship for NHTI. In his field of 82 runners, Lemire, who hails from Weare, was the standout, running a 5:30.6 mile average while beating all other opponents by a margin of 26 seconds. His overall finishing time of 27:23.5 was three seconds faster than the winning mark of last season. He became the

first NHTI national champion since Hall of Famer Heather Searles in 2008; it was also the best men's finish in the national meet since Hall of Famer Ignacio (Nacho) Hernando finished second in 2011.

Congratulations to JSRHS senior Alexis Boudreau, who was selected to the Girls Soccer 2024 New England All-Region team. Only a select few players from New Hampshire are recognized each year for this prestigious honor.



Boudreau has received New Hampshire All-State honors as the JSRHS starting goalkeeper for the past three seasons and was team captain this year.



Ivy Li, mother of CWES student Allie Li, was the "Royal Reader" in Barbara Grantz's second grade class in early December. "Royal Readers" are family members invited by the students to read a special book to the class. The readers are welcomed by a red carpet, music and saluting students.

Mrs. Grantz started the "Royal Reader" program more than two decades ago and continued it off and on throughout her teaching career. She restarted her "Royal Readers" in recent years after a former student -now a preschool teacher herself -- told her how memorable it was and that she has "Royal Readers" in her own classroom. "Royal Reader" is an example of SAU 24's goal to increase family engagement through intentional connections and communications.
