Dog Licenses

The Weare Town Clerk would like to thank all residents who licensed their dogs before the deadline of April 30.

There are around 2,600 dogs in town and just about 60% have been registered so far.

Town officials will be reaching out by phone to residents who have not licensed their dogs.

Beginning on June 1, a \$25 civil forfeiture fee will be assessed, plus a \$1 per month late fee until the dog is licensed.

If your dog's rabies vaccination has expired and you have an appointment scheduled, please call or email the town offices so records can be updated.

Dogs can be licensed in person during normal business hours: Mondays, Tuesdays and Fridays, 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. or Wednesdays, 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. The office is closed Thursdays. Go online to register anytime at www.weare.nh.gov.

Design Plans Moving Forward to Replace River Road Bridge

At a lightly attended public input presentation at the Old Town Hall on April 30, Thom Marshall from Jacobs Engineering outlined the steps being taken for the design of the River Road Bridge that spans the Piscataquog River between the intersections at Rockland Road and at Buzzell Hill Road. Marshall is the project manager for the design team hired by the Town of Weare. He explained that there are three design phases: an engineering study, preliminary design, and final design to contract documents. They are presently in the preliminary design phase, he said.

Also present at the meeting were Weare Public Works Director Jason Fiske, Weare Town Administrator Naomi Bolton, and Julie Avenant, project manager for the New Hampshire Department of Transportation Bureau of Planning and Community Assistance. When asked if state funds were available for the project, Avenant said that they were. The project is eligible for 80% reimbursement through state and federal funds. Money for the design phase will come from the State Aid Bridge Program and construction phase funds will come from the federal Bridge Replacement and Rehabilitation Program. Both phases require a 20% local match.

Although the bridge has undergone repairs in 1997, 2016, and 2024, the concrete abutments, that date back to 1939, are now deteriorating leading to the need for a complete replacement of the structure. When asked about a timeline for the project, Public Works Director Jason Fiske said it would be 2026. He said that there would be another public input session before that time.

Anticipating the replacement of the River Road Bridge as well as smaller bridge replacement projects on Lull Road and Old Francestown Road, the town established a Bridge Reconstruction Capital Reserve Fund in 2017 with an initial \$105,000 placed in that fund, with additional amounts approved by voters in subsequent years. According to Finance Director Beth Rouse there is presently \$281,000 in

that fund with an additional \$326,966 which was received through state bridge aid in 2022.

In 2025 \$47,075 from the capital reserve fund has been spent to date on the preliminary design phase of the River Road Bridge, with 80% of that eligible for reimbursable, Rouse said.




